


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HUDSON TAYLOR: MISSIONARY TO CHINA



James Hudson Taylor, famous missionary to China, was born in 1832. Amazingly, when he was about five years old, he often said, "When I am a man, I will be a missionary and go to China"! At the age of fifteen he became a bank

clerk. He was brought to faith in Christ through reading a religious tract. His mother, at this time, was pleading with God for his conversion. He felt God speaking to him and saying: "Go for me to China". So, at the age of 17 he committed himself to become a missionary to China. He began to learn Chinese.

He went to London for medical training. At this stage of life, he learned to deal with people's souls to lead them to Christ. An opportunity came for him to travel to China and in 1853 he was commended by the Chinese Evangelisation Society to go as a missionary to China. He set sail on the "Dumfries" and after five and a half months reached Shanghai. At this date war was going on in China. But Hudson Taylor and his colleagues went from city to city to spread the gospel. Most of these cities had never been given any gospel knowledge. At this stage he took the decision, not shared by other missionaries, to wear a pigtail and Chinese dress. He was encouraged when a young Chinaman



became converted to Christ. He had two sides to his work: medical and spiritual.

About this time he met up with the saintly William Chalmers Burns. Their method was to go to a town and there preach the gospel and give away tracts. In some towns there were drug dealers and criminals.


He was able to give medical help to the mandarins at the city of Swatow. Here he parted from W. C. Burns, whom he never met again. At this point George Müller in England heard of the work of Hudson Taylor and became a supporter of the mission in China.

After being three years in China, Hudson Taylor decided to leave the Chinese Evangelisation Society. He intended to place his trust in God. And in this he was not disappointed. God gave him much blessing.

Hudson Taylor married on January 20th, 1858 to a lady who was helping in the mission school, Maria Dyer. At Ningpo there were encouragements. Two Chinese men, professed faith in Christ: Neng Kuli and a painter named Wang. Life was difficult but the Taylors trusted in God and God provided wonderfully for them.




The Taylors now took ship to England because their health was in serious decline. Wang, the painter, travelled with them to help them in their state of frail health. So ended their first spell of active missionary service in China. The date was 1859. They had served in China for six and a half very busy and perilous years. The Taylors were now back in England after six and a half years' service in China. They needed to rest, but also set about making a better translation of the Chinese New Testament. They now took up residence in London. Burdened by the thought that millions of unsaved people were dying all the time with no gospel knowledge he sought to appeal for missionaries to go to China from Britain. His book, "China's Spiritual Needs and Claims" stirred many to



feel their duty to go to serve Christ in China. The mission was now called the China Inland Mission.


Grattan Guinness, an evangelist, accompanied Hudson Taylor to Ireland. As a result, a number of Christians were inspired to serve Christ. A mission party now prepared to sail to China on the "Lammermuir" ship. They departed in May 1866 and reached Shanghai months later. They took with them medicinal and printing facilities.



For sixteen months their mission was at Hang Chow. But there was a concern to get the gospel to the huge Inland Provinces lying in spiritual darkness. The difficult task of the missionaries was to bring the gospel to the ignorant heathen multitudes. At this stage of their work they faced opposition and hatred which demanded great faith and suffering for Christ's sake. However, Chinese who were converted now undertook the duty of preaching the gospel. Mr and Mrs Taylor now went to Yang-Chow where they had a mission station. Mrs Taylor here

developed cholera and died in July 1870. Exhausted, Hudson Taylor returned to England in 1872. In November he married a Miss Faulding. They went to live in Stoke Newington. This year he appealed for eighteen new workers for the mission in China.

After eighteen months Hudson Taylor and his new wife set out for China. Although some of the workers in the field were becoming now elderly and less fit he set about encouraging the missionaries. Money for the mission was scarce. But the missionaries now entered into new territory to win souls for Christ.




Hudson Taylor would not allow people to give him honour or praise. He said: "I am the little servant of an illustrious Master".

He returned to England and damaged his spine. Back home he further promoted the mission. He returned to China in 1876 where he oversaw the work of his colleagues. It was a very busy time. But the gospel was being taken far and near to the people of China. In 1888 he went to China via America. An American branch of the C. I. M. (China Inland Mission) was formed.

In 1897 Hudson Taylor went to China for the tenth time. In 1902 his wife died. In 1905 he travelled across America to Shanghai. Hudson Taylor passed away on June 3rd, 1905.

In 1926 came the Sixtieth Anniversary of the China Inland Mission (C. I. M.) At that date the C. I. M. had been wonderfully blessed by God. These are among the statistics: 1134 missionaries; 260 mission stations; the membership of the Chinese Christian churches was 67, 463. In total, 104,935 persons had been baptized since the mission work began. God truly blessed Hudson Taylor.



In the same token, we need to establish **Family Prayer Bubbles** or **FPBs** in the spiritual realm around our children in the covenant home as we intercede for and with them daily.
